#### • Renewing the Life of the Earth: An Eco-Theology <u>Resource</u>

This new Anglican Communion resource includes a set of excellent video presentations on ecological theology and practice. The videos present a range of voices from across the communion and are designed for anyone who wants to engage with issues relating to ecological theology and practice, including theological colleges and church programs. Episcopal Church leaders, including the Rev. Richard Acosta and the Rev. Margaret Bullitt-Jonas, contributed short videos about how the church's mission must change in a time of climate/ecological emergency.

• Ocean Equity Collective Language Guide

The Ocean Equity Collective is a coalition of BIPOC-led organizations and people focused on holistic ocean conservation, protection, and appreciation. Their goal is to foster the next generation of ocean stewardship and create a community-centered sustainability movement where all people can access and cherish the ocean's ecosystems. Their mission is to address historical inequities in the ocean conservation movement and include historically excluded communities in the protection and enjoyment of the ocean's ecosystems. To aid community support work, they have created a language guide to help individuals, organizations, and corporations better communicate with communities and decolonize their language.

# Winter

Advent - The four Sundays before Christmas. Consider using natural elements for your Advent wreaths and using beeswax sheets to make your candles.

Feast of Saint Brigid, February 1 - Eve of February 2, patron saint of cattle, dairymaida, and chicken farmers. A common tradition is to make crosses out of reeds or straw.

Candlemas, February 2, -the halfway point between the winter solstice (Yule) and the spring equinax (Ostara) (also known as Imbolic.) Candlemas is traditionally a time to have candles blessed that you then use in your home for holy days and feasts. Common foods are crepes (a French tradition) or tamales (a Mexican tradition.)

Saint Abigail, February 11 - patron saint of honeybees and beekeepers.

# Spring

Saint Gertrude of Nivelles, March 17- patron saint of cats (including barn and garden cats!)

**Easter** – Always a wonderful time to celebrate new life, in the garden and in the barnyards.

Rogation Days, three days before Ascension Day These are the major liturgical days that honor agrarian life.

Saint Isidore, May 15, - patron saint of farmers.

Saint Honoré May 16 - patron saint of bakers.

## Summer

Corpus Christ, June 8 - the day we honor the bread and the wine, the body and the blood. A good day for bread baking and wine making.

Feast of the Assumption of Mary, August 15 - A wonderful day to hold a Blessing of the Herbs (a tradition harking back to medieval times.)

# Autumn

Saint Fiacre, September 1, - patron saint of gardeners.

Hildegard of Bingen, September 17 - Considered by scholars to be the founder of scientific natural history in Germany.

Michaelmas, the Feast of Michael and the Archangels, September 29 - Often tied to autumn rogation days. Michaelmas is often honored with large harvest-themed celebrations, and apple dishes.

Feast of Saint Francis, October 6 - A time to host the Blessing of the Animals.

Saint Martin's Day, November II - A day associated with the harvesting of the hags in Iberia, and drinking the first of the new wine all over Europe. (It is also a holiday festival in Germany with a lot of fun traditions.)
