Orientation:	
Identify immigration attorney/legal	
services organization who can	
provide information at community	
meeting about	
deportation/detention process and	
how families can obtain legal help	
for individuals detained	
Family/Custody Needs:	
Identify family law attorney or	
others who can address questions	
regarding children or other	
dependents who might have been	
left behind when	
parents/caretakers were detained	
at raid.	
 May also have to help community 	
members with information	
regarding interacting with CPS if	
children were placed with that	
agency	
Community Organizing	
 Identify what Community 	
Leaders/Organizations/Unions can	
assist the impacted community to	
become organized and facilitate	
decision making by impacted family	
members and community. That can	
mobilize impacted communities	
and allies to take public action	
when necessary	
Mental Health Needs:	
Identify mental health Identify mental health	
professionals who might be able to coordinate resources for families or	
individuals who need counseling or	
support after a raid. This can also include health providers with	
specialties in anxiety management	
Social Service Needs:	
Identify individual or entity who	
will coordinate response to social	
needs stemming from the raid (for	
instance, housing or food assistance	
for families who face financial	
hardship following the raid)	
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Interpreter Needs:	
 Identify individual or entity who 	
will coordinate a group of	
interpreters to assist others	
 If there are particular linguistic 	
communities in your region (for	
instance, indigenous communities),	
interpreters for those languages	
should be identified	
Bond Fund Support:	
 Identify individual/entity who 	
could coordinate effort to help	
families raise funds to pay bonds so	
family members can be released	
from detention	
Transportation Needs:	
 Identify an individual or entity 	
willing to coordinate volunteers to	
transport family members to	
hearings at detention center or for	
other reasons	
Document Gathering:	
 Identify an individual or entity 	
willing to help coordinate	
volunteers who can help families	
gather or obtain documents that	
might be helpful in immigration	
cases or other matters (e.g. birth	
certificates, medical records, court	
records, etc)	
Media Response:	
Identify individuals or entity	
willing to help coordinate media	
response and develop local talking	
points regarding raid. Help prepare impacted families/communities to	
speak to the media. Make videos or	
write the stories of impacted	
community for social media	
Liaison with Local Government:	
Identify individual or entity willing	
to coordinate with local	
government officials regarding	
their possible role in responding to	
needs post-raid.	
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Elected Official Allies	
 Identify elected officials ahead of 	
time who will act as advocates for	
the release detained community	
members	
Identify Holding Facilities and ICE	
Personnel	
 Identify and collect contact 	
information for the "Community	
Outreach Coordinators" or other	
local ICE officials who would have	
decision making power regarding	
release of people detained.	
 Individuals detained by 	
immigration in Washington will	
generally be transferred to the	
Northwest Detention Center but	
some may be held temporarily in	
local facilities; identify any	
potential temporary locations and	
have contact information available
